

# Gender Affirming Care in Cairns: Questions Young People Are Asking



Question: Is it true that gender care is illegal now?

Answer: No. Gender-affirming care is not illegal.

But right now, there's a government review into genderaffirming care, which means public services like Cairns Sexual Health Service can't start new gender care for people under 18. If you were already a client, you still get your care. You still have other options too (see below):





#### Where you can go:

- Kaleidoscope Clinic: You don't need a referral. You can talk to a doctor or psychologist.
- **YETI:** A social group for young people (aged 14-25) with people who get it
- Gayawur Rainbow (QC): Peer support, help with binders and referrals, and people to talk to

**Question:** I heard that puberty blockers or hormones are dangerous. Is that true?

Answer: No. Puberty blockers have been safely used for years and are reversible. Hormones are part of medical care for some people and can be life-saving. You can always talk it through to doctors who understand this stuff.







## Where you can go:

- Kaleidoscope Clinic: Can help with hormone information and care plans
- Transcend Australia: Has fact sheets for young people and families

**Question:** Are school nurses allowed to help anymore?

Answer: Some can help and some have pulled back. This is one reason we're talking with Education and Health together - to make it better.





## Where you can go:

- Cairns Sexual Health Service for STI checks, contraception, and other sexual health matters unrelated to gender care
- Talk to your school wellbeing team if you trust them
- Ask Gayawur (QC) or YETI for help with safer options

Question: My parents are scared they'll get in trouble for helping me. Can they?

Answer: No, supporting you is **not a crime**. But the rules are confusing right now, and that's causing fear. We're working to fix the confusion.





## Where you can go:

- **PFLAG Cairns:** Parent support group who get it
- Gayawur (QC): Can talk with your family or help you do it

Question: I don't have money or transport. Can I still get help?

Answer: Yes. Some clinics bulk bill, and there are funds that help with gap fees (like Project 491 for under-18s). Gayawur or YETI can help you find the right support





### Where you can go:

- Gayawur (QC): Peer navigators can help you sort out costs, access and referrals.
- YETI: Can help connect you to support services

**Question:** Is it true that people are using DIY hormones?

Answer: Yes, some people are, but it's risky and not recommended. It happens when the system fails people. You deserve safe and supported care. You're not alone.





#### Where you can go:

- Kaleidoscope Clinic or Gayawur (QC): Can talk to you about safer care
- **2Spirits / MGOV:** Can help with binders, tucker packs, and support.

**Question:** Can I still go to Cairns Sexual Health Service if I'm under 18 and need sexual health care?

Answer: Yes. Even though the gender services got people under 18 are limited right now, Cairns Sexual Health Service still sees people under 18 for STI checks, contraception, walk-ins and anything else unrelated to gender care.



Did you know? Many school nurses also have free condoms and pregnancy tests. You can ask them directly.

## Where you can go:

- Cairns Sexual Health: Walk-in for STI testing and sexual health
- Your school nurse or wellbeing team: Ask what's available
